Hello everyone!

Since our last newsletter you have all probably been relaxing, vacationing and enjoying the warm weather. Well, mostly it's been warm. I can't figure the weather out this year. Seems we have had a lot of rain.

Somewhere I read, "Without rain, nothing grows". So, just keep thinking of the flowers blooming and smile when it rains out your picnic, parade, etc.!

OK, enough small talk. I read an article in my local paper and thought some of us could help with this! The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources is calling on citizens to help with a simple survey of wild turkeys this summer. Do you ever see wild turkeys? They visit my yard occasionally or cross my driveway. They're not flashy but I like them.

During July and August whenever you see wild turkey hens, poults (which from the article must be "kids") or gobblers, you record your observations and then send it in to the Department so they can compile the data into a statewide index that gauges the summer's turkey hatch, which helps assess population levels. This provides valuable information for the Department's turkey management program.

Hopefully a survey copy is included in this newsletter. So, go out there and count turkeys!! (In case Joyce doesn't have space to include the actual survey, here's the information to find it on line at the KY Fish and Wildlife website: go to "fw.ky.gov" and search under key words "turkey survey".)

GFWC-KY Annual Convention Arts, Crafts & Photography Contests Report

CLUBWOMAN OF THE YEAR EVELYN WALLACE

Flabbergasted, stunned, and thankful were some of the words used by Evelyn Wallace of the Murray Woman's Club in First District when her name was announced as GFWC Kentucky's Outstanding Clubwoman for 2016 at the state convention in May. That is Evelyn's personality: humble, soft-spoken, and genuinely surprised by her accomplishments. She is a liaison for the Murray Woman's Club, inviting newcomers to become involved and informing all women in the community about the mission and benefits of becoming a member of the MWC.

Evelyn has been an enthusiastic, active member of the Murray Woman's Club since 1985. In those years she has served in a variety of departmental and general club offices, including Chairman of the Kappa Department since 1996 until assuming the role of General Club President in June of 2016. Her calm demeanor and steady leadership have been valuable in leading the club and department through a number of fundraisers and civic obligations. With each challenge met, she has grown in confidence and leadership, gaining the respect of all.

One of the most recent challenges involved maintenance and improvements to the 80-year-old clubhouse. Necessary improvements to the building to make it more accessible with handrails and improved sidewalk/parking were completed. Due to serving food to the public, the kitchen had to be upgraded in order to have it certified as a commercial facility. As you can imagine, retro-fitting and updating such an historic structure was daunting and expensive.

Evelyn's leadership and determination have proven most valuable in managing a diverse group of women who must be heard and respected. She has listened and facilitated a number of planning sessions related to these renovations, keeping everyone on-track and productive, with the common goal of improving the facility and maintaining friendships within the group. Her leadership continued to serve as an anchor as the club moved into the funding phase of these projects.

She is a very effective representative of the Murray Woman's Club to the greater community. Each Monday she is a guest on the local radio station, where she keeps the listeners informed about club goals, activities, fundraisers and community projects. Thanks to her knowledge of local history, our nominee brings a special flair to the broadcasts, weaving in personal stories and historical highlights. As the daughter and granddaughter of MWC members, she brings a unique sense of place and history as part of her community outreach to members and potential members.

Evelyn is a cancer survivor and active member of the local breast cancer support group. She is always willing to meet with newly-diagnosed women, providing assurance and comfort to them. This year, as part of breast cancer awareness week, she worked with the local newspaper to share her personal story of survival, which provided inspiration to many women in the community as well as comfort for their families.

She is a very visible presence in the community, especially in the fall, when she can be seen at the farmer's market and small vendor sites around town providing mums, pumpkins and bales of hay for sale to all. Her friendly manner, enthusiasm for our town and civic organizations is obvious as she meets new people, and customers often leave as friends.

As a lifelong resident of Calloway County, Evelyn has a deep knowledge and respect for our club's place in local history and enthusiastically promotes both at every opportunity. Her presence and leadership in the community brings honor to our organization as she continues to be an advocate for the ideals of GFWC.

I hope everyone reads this article because it contains some very practical tips for recruiting and retaining members in our organization. With membership dwindling across the country, it is vital that everyone does her part to bring in, keep, and celebrate members.

Here are a few of the successful ideas that were shared by the 24 clubs that reported for 2016:

Free food + door prizes + planning + participation + execution = success. That is what the Radcliff Woman's Club enjoyed when 77 women attended the club's first Meet & Greet. The 14-member executive board held a 2-hour meeting to discuss the idea and the benefits such an event would bring in recruiting new members from the community. With the president heading the planning committee, a date was set. Ads inviting the public were placed in 2 local newspapers; flyers were designed, printed, and placed in businesses known to be frequented by area women; and Facebook and the website were kept current regarding the event. That night members decorated and arranged tables around a refreshment buffet in the center of the room. A wide variety of finger foods and desserts were prepared by clubwomen. Display tables ringing the room held GFWC Kentucky and club information, showcased member and student arts and crafts, press books for review, story boards with club photographs highlighting activities, and upcoming fundraisers. A clubwoman was at each table to explain what the club does, why it is done, and how it benefits the community. Guests were encouraged to sign a guest book with contact information and personal interests in order to be eligible for 1 of the 6 donated door prizes. This information was used to contact prospective members. The president presented an overview of how individual members and the club fit into the district, state, and international organizations.

This club believes that when a member is having fun she will sustain her membership and invite others to participate, thus accomplishing the double goals of recruiting new members and retaining established members. One way the Okolona Woman's Club has been able to do that is through their decision to have a different meeting theme each month with appropriate decorations. Who wouldn't like to be Queen for a Day where you can wear a crown and hear Miss Kentucky USA? Or having the Bachelor (a local florist who brought a rose for each member) asking you if you would accept his rose? Or bringing in your high school graduation picture to share? Christmas, Mardi Gras, and the club's birthday were celebrated with parties. Add in a "Cabin Fever" night, a pirate night, an international night with native dress, and a patriotic meeting and you have quite a diversity of themes sure to keep the excitement going.

Bowling Green Junior Woman's Club utilized a healthy mix of social events and having fun together outside of meetings and volunteering for membership. They maintained a variety of occasions to get more members and guests involved. The club used a wreath making party; going to dinner and having potlucks; walking in 5K races; trips to concerts, shows, and ball games; and a paint party in addition to regular social events to add new members.

Club business cards were provided for all members of the Bullitt County Woman's Club to pass out to women in the community. Information on the club, GFWC Kentucky, and GFWC were on the front. On the back a place was provided for members to write in the location, date, and time of the next meeting along with the member's name and contact information. These were used as a marketing tool and an invitation for women to come to a meeting.

A major goal of the Jackson's Woman's Club in 2016 was the club-wide recruitment of new members, particularly targeting women who exhibited leadership and were interested in community involvement, service, and improvement. It was felt that an influx of new members would bring new life and ideas while insuring the club would be sustained over time due to a steadily aging membership. To help facilitate the integration of the new membership, the club yearbook now contains a picture of each member along with their current contact information, committee appointments, and other pertinent facts. As new members are added, an addendum to the yearbook is printed with the same information. This makes it much easier to put new names with new faces and quickly facilitates incorporating everyone into the group.

A new member recruitment was held where members were encouraged to invite a prospective member to the meeting held at a locally owned restaurant. Any member of the Morgan County Woman's Club who brought a guest received a free dessert with her dinner. The prospective member also received a dessert of her choice, compliments of the club. Each clubwoman whose guest joined and paid dues that night had her name entered into a drawing for a \$50 gift certificate to a local spa. Orders were taken for club shirts for the new members as a gift from the club.

The Woman's Club of St. Matthews needed to get the word out to the community to let everyone know the club was still very active as a lot of people thought the club no longer existed since the clubhouse had been sold. Their solution? The city has quarterly newsletters that are sent to every home in St. Matthews. The club made sure every newsletter had an article telling about the club, what they were doing for the community, and activities to which women were invited.

Barbourville Woman's Study Club adopted the attitude that everyone is important and has a unique ability to contribute. The synergy created has allowed the club to merge the knowledge and wisdom of more experienced members with the enthusiasm and technological experience of newer members, resulting in both a firm foundation for the club and fresh ideas.

You want your sister clubwomen there when things in life are hard, and Okolona Woman's Club is good at that. When a family member of a clubwoman dies, the clubhouse is offered for family gatherings. Food is donated and served for funeral meals.

Radcliff Woman's Club participated in a number city events, worked with other civic and church groups, and held several fundraisers throughout the year. They were a visible force in the community but needed a way to distinguish their club from other participating organizations. To that end, several green aprons with the club monogram were purchased and worn when serving food at the Mayor's Breakfast, opening day for the Community Center pool, and fundraising dinners. Four club banners of varying sizes and two magnetic signs for vehicles were used for parade participation. Brochures highlighting club projects, areas of volunteerism, and basic club information were distributed at these events.

Prestonsburg Woman's Club helped to host a Women's Conference at Big Sandy Community & Technical College. They provided homemade breakfast items throughout the morning sessions. In order to give prospective members a better idea of club activities and projects, members talked about the club in addition to having brochures and yearbooks available.

Madisonville switched to membership notebooks instead of printed booklets, which lowered costs significantly. Moving the location of meetings and choosing another caterer varied the routine enough to bring an exciting, refreshing change to members.
