

The Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership Organization "HOBY" is an international cooperating organization of the GFWC that develops and encourages young leaders to make positive changes to themselves, their communities, and ultimately, our global society. Every summer, HOBY Kentucky hosts a 4-day Leadership Seminar which brings together approximately 250 rising juniors from high schools across the state. During these four days, ambassadors are introduced to a four-part leadership model that touches on varying topics including self-efficacy, college and career decisions, diversity and inclusion, and setting realistic goals. The seminar ends with a charge to make a difference in their community by putting their leadership into action through service hours. All students are challenged to complete at least one hundred hours of community service over the course of one calendar year, and the results are powerful! Each year, the HOBY alumni from Kentucky alone provide approximately 25,000 hours of service across the state.

Housing, feeding, and providing the curriculum and necessary materials for these ambassadors from every corner of Kentucky is quite a task, and requires assistance from the community that will, in turn, be impacted by the work of these inspiring young people. HOBY Kentucky is a completely volunteer driven not-for-profit organization, as our profit is found in the positive difference our alumni make in their community, the state, and the world. This does mean that we rely solely on volunteers and donations of time, talent, goods, and funding.
