I have enjoyed traveling and seeing the wonderful points of interest in different parts of Kentucky along with attending GFWC Kentucky club meetings and district fall conferences.


Representing GFWC Kentucky at SER and GFWC International convention was an honor.

In July we begin our meetings back with our executive committee meeting first and then our first regular club meeting begins!

August and September brought about preparation for our only regular fundraiser of the year – the Daniel Boone Festival Royalty Coronation and other activities! In 2021, BJWSC hosted two Coronations which was double the work and fun for our members. We distribute applications; have a candidate drive-thru picnic, a queen's tea, the coronation and crowning of our royalty, decoration of floats and windows for display of the candidates, and the grand finale, a parade! October finished the activities of the Daniel Boone week and began our preparation for breast cancer awareness! Club women wore pink several times a month along with advocating for Breast Cancer Awareness Research.

November is our time to celebrate Children's Book Week with free books to students as well as celebrate our veterans with a program, cards and more! We also promoted National Donor Sabbath during the month of November while also


promoting safety during the upcoming holiday season.

Recently, the May Day funds have helped to preserve the Carnegie Library in Corbin, supply classroom needs, and Christmas food and toy programs, among other worthwhile causes.

For 50 years, June Martin has "gotten together" with other OCC members to do the work of the club; she has "stuck

together" with club members; and she is still "pulling together" with members to keep our club strong for the future needs of our community and world.


