The GFWC Morehead Woman's Club isn't happy unless we're busy and that describes the first three months of 2022. The club has enlisted the assistance of two high school senior boys to build us four Little Libraries that will be ready for placement in May. The boys are doing this project as a special assignment for a grade. We are excited to give them this experience and get the libraries in four different areas of the county. We ended the meeting by making Valentine Cards for two assisted living centers and the local nursing home.

At the February meeting, we celebrated our success by looking at the number of projects and programs completed in 2021, dollars donated by club members and the number of volunteer hours the club women did by doing something to improve our community, our district, our region, and the state. The meeting ended with making pinecone birdfeeders. Of course, we made a mess.

In March we celebrated Women's History Month with a Barbie Doll exhibit of the women's suffrage movement. The Barbies depicted different women in history that fought for the passage of the 19th amendment. In the fall, the club awarded a \$500 scholarship to a Morehead State University instructor to participate in Leadership Kentucky. Angela Rowe attended the March club meeting telling us about the program and the places in Kentucky where the program took her. Books were presented to the Mayor of Morehead, a woman, and the Public Library in honor of Women's History Month. The book, "A Vote for Susanna, The First Woman Mayor" by Karen M. Greenwald is the story of how Susanna Salter of Argonia, Kansas, who became Mayor in 1887.

The March meeting was a busy meeting making plans for April's National Library Week's celebration at the Rowan County Public Library. The club is having a contest during the week for patrons to guess the number of books in the library. Also, during the week, those checking out books will receive a new bookmark with a poem written about what's inside the library and information about the club.

Plans are also being made for Prevent Child Abuse Awareness month. April 1st, the club will plant a pinwheel garden at the Rowan County Arts Center's Freedom Park. The club is sponsoring a pinwheel coloring contest with the four elementary schools' art teachers. At the end of April, each school will have a drawing for a new bicycle selected from the pinwheels colored by the students along with additional prizes. The club is also hosting a Family Community Phots Scavenger Hunt. Ten places in downtown Morehead were selected and families are encouraged to take a walk and take a picture of the ten places. Photos are then submitted to the club and a drawing will be held at the end of April for first, second, and third place prizes of gift cards of various values of downtown businesses.

We will close out our club year in May by recognizing our outgoing 2022 Distinguished Young Woman, make plans for the 2023 DYW program in June and installation of new officers and chairmen. Then, and only then, do we rest.
