I hope this message finds you well. I am excited to inform you about an upcoming event that is close to our hearts: **The General Federation of Women's Clubs (GFWC) Advocates for Children Week**, which will take place from **Sunday, October 20 to Saturday, October 26, 2024**.

This week is a pivotal opportunity for us to come together and focus our efforts on advocating for the rights and well-being of children in our communities. As GFWC members, we are uniquely positioned to raise awareness, support, and action on behalf of children, and this week allows us to do just that.

To inspire you and your clubs, here are some ideas for projects that you can undertake during this special week:

Education and Libraries

The Summer Summit was a great time to learn and teach! For my presentation for Education and Libraries, I wanted to inform the club members of how they could work in the school systems and libraries. As a retired teacher, I can tell you that an extra pair of hands in the classroom is invaluable. GFWC club members can volunteer at the libraries for special projects. For example, PWC plans to volunteer at our library in October during the “Antique Road Show.” This is not a television show, but the same concept.

Club members could read to students during Read Across America Week in March, conduct tutoring during or after school, and assist with academic teams. Additionally, you may want to donate for Field Trips and lunches. Another important endeavor is the Backpack Program--- students take home food for the weekend in these backpacks.

A lesson plan and a hands-on activity were provided for each Club to take home. The theme of the lesson plan was the Great Seal of the United States. Individuals could teach the lesson to a class or provide the lesson to a classroom teacher and assist the teacher. An eagle was given to each club --- the eagle could be used as a classroom gift after the lesson is taught. Participants at the Summer Summit made a bookmark of the Great Seal for their hands-on project to take home.

Also, I informed the Summit attendees that they could find other suggestions for Education and Libraries in the GFWC Club Manual.

FROM PADDLES TO PICKELBALL

At our spring convention, those in attendance participated in a Quarter Auction. Fun was had by all with this activity and information was given as to what is needed to do a Quarter Auction.

Move to June, Chicago, International Convention – the Fundraising Committee for GFWC did two workshops during the convention on different ways of fundraising. Again, information on how to have a Quarter Auction was given to those in attendance.

Now, move to August, Washington DC, Board of Directors Meeting – the theme was Pickleball but a Quarter Auction was held each day of the Board meeting. The Board was taught how to have a Quarter Auction and the fundraising committee raised over \$4300 in three days with 190 people in attendance.

Now it's your turn to have one at your club meeting or as a fundraiser. It's easy. It's fun. Here's how to do it. You don't have to go the expense of fancy paddles like we had at the state convention. Paper plates, index card, or a theme cutouts can be used with numbers on them. Items to give away? White elephant, homemade crafts, baked goods, gift cards, holiday theme items. You pick. Have fun coming up with items. Numbers. You can use balls as we used for the state (you can purchase from Amazon) but you can use pieces of paper or even use a computer and set up a random draw. That way everybody will see what the computer is picking.



Sell your paddles for \$1-\$5. Ask people to bring quarters or sell chips - \$10 equals 40 chips. At the Board

Meeting, we sold tickets which served as quarters. Sell a package deal. At the Board meeting, we sold for \$25, you get two paddles and 12 tickets. We also sold \$10 additional paddles and extra tickets 6 for \$5. You do what is best for you to do.

Show the item being auctioned off. Give the value of the item being auctioned off. Give the number of quarters, chips or tickets it will take to get into the pool. Have bags, bowls, something for participants to put their quarters, chips or tickets into. If an item is worth 3 quarters; it is 3 quarters for each paddle they want to play. Once you have given time to get in, say "paddles up" and draw the number. No one with that number played, draw again until someone wins.

It may take a little time to get everybody to catch on but once they do, watch out. That when the fun starts and we find out who has competitiveness in them. Good Luck!

GFWC LEGISLATION AND PUBLIC POLICY

GOALS...EDUCATE, ENGAGE AND EMPOWER our members!

Steps to being involved in the promotion of legislation and public policy:

1. EVERYONE needs to sign up for the Legislative Action Center which is a powerful tool to keep you informed on public issues and advocacy efforts. You can view your local election center by inputting your zip code. You can also see resources, your officials and candidates for your area. You can sign up for legislative alerts via your email and zip. You can find legislation on any particular subject by inputting keywords. Finally, you can see how your officials voted on key legislation. Please encourage your club members to sign up to be a part of the Legislative Action Center!
 2. Have your club write a proclamation and educate the community about it. Have your proclamation endorsed by public officials. Invite everyone and promote the cause for the proclamation.
 3. Conduct a program on GFWC resolutions. These are found on the GFWC website, under the member portal, digital library and search resolutions for something important to you, your club or your community. Download the resolution and share!
 4. Invite a local decision maker to your club meeting. Perhaps a senator or member of the house of representatives, a mayor, city council or local law enforcement to share their knowledge.
 5. Develop a club project to support a resolution. Search GFWC website for a topic or area of need or interest and work on it!
 6. Take action on a resolution. Write emails to your legislators, send letters to the editor, post community events that support the resolution, form a community coalition and share it ALL on social media.
 7. Draft a resolution and submit it to GFWC for consideration and to see if it "fits" into our programs. Start with a title. Explain your
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rationale. Resolve to follow thru and submit to GFWC with supporting information and signatures.

8. Visit your state legislators and/or staff. Hold your legislators accountable for their votes and what they support or don't support. Let legislators know your club's stance on issues. Present fact sheets, information and statistics to further explain your stance. When corresponding please make sure to include your contact information so that your legislator can get back to you on the issues being discussed if you don't get thru. Follow up with contacts and always show your appreciation with a thank you note.

What is Civic Engagement?

It is making a difference in the lives of our community and developing the knowledge, skills, values and motivation to make a difference. It is promoting the life of community.

Just as the stones we painted during Summer Summit, if thrown in a puddle, a pond, a creek, a river even the ocean, will make a ripple that reaches further than just the stones themselves. Civic engagement, at the local community level will reach further than just your community. Once started it too has a ripple affect.



Kentucky has seen more than its share of natural disasters. That is why I am asking each GFWC KY club to look at what you can do to help your community be prepared for the next natural disaster. There are many options and ways. Reach out to the closest National Weather Service Office; in Kentucky there are 3 (Jackson, Paducah and Louisville); Northern KY, is served by the Wilmington, Ohio office and North East KY is served by the Charleston, WV office. These offices have staff who will gladly come speak to your club and/or do a community event. They will also provide educational materials, and may even let you come tour their office. Contact your local Emergency Manager, the Health Department, Fire Department or Police Department. All of these groups are glad to come educate and help your clubs. Having these groups or individuals at your club meeting also gives you the opportunity to thank them for serving your community.

You can also create Disaster Preparedness kits for club members or give them to the most vulnerable in your community. By helping your communities become disaster prepared you are creating the ripple affect and our entire state will become disaster prepared.

Reduce, Reuse, Recycle! Let's add Repurpose!

Many GFWCKY members do their part to help our environment by following the triangle of Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. Purchasing items with less packaging, taking reusable tote bags to the grocery store, using reusable water bottles and collecting paper, cardboard, metals and plastics to deliver to the Recycling Center all contribute to the cause.

A fourth "R" can be added, it is Repurpose. Taking an item that may be thrown away and using it for a new purpose. Many agreed that our grandmothers may have been the best at this! Examples such as bottles with fairy lights, "Oui" yogurt glass jars decorated and used for storage, wire wrapped bottles used as vases and an old chair painted and used as a stand for plants were displayed at the summer workshop.

Workshop attendees were invited to make an ornament or package topper from used canning jars lids or bottle caps. Several cute snowmen were crafted. Members also shared ideas and projects that they or their club had done.

The Conservation State Project was briefly discussed. We are all scientists in many ways, through curiosity, making observation, collecting data, and finding answers to questions. Club members are invited to become a Citizen Scientist by making observations in your backyard. We will be using the Merlin Bird ID app, download the Cornell edition, it is free. It can use a photo or a bird song to help identify birds that you see or hear. September is the beginning of migration for many species, so new birds may be seen. There will be more information, with some specific survey dates in which you can participate.
