"Light the Way in Kentucky with KFWC"

A few of the highlights of Romanza's term as President:

- During Romanza's term as State President of what was then named KFWC (Kentucky Federation of Woman's Club), Kentucky chartered 4 new clubs bringing the total clubs in Kentucky to 178 with 7,900 members.
- Also during Romanza's term, Hospice was only just forming in very county in Kentucky. KFWC donated over \$7000 to promote publicity for Hospice and also sold note cards to raise money for Hospice services. Many of us know of the good work Hospice (now Hosparus) does for families and is well known by everyone.
- Over 80 clubs participated in the Adopt-a-Highway project and the clubs helped keep the highways clean.
- 53 clubs participated in educating the public about a health condition that was relatively new to most at that time - they sponsored AIDS education and workshops.
- ◆ 120 clubs took on the project of Nutrition with 248 projects, 856 hours and raised over \$17,000.00
- KFWC was a strong supporter of HOBY Youth Leadership at that time. 39 of the clubs sponsored a HOBY student.
- Clubs in Kentucky donated over \$75,000.00 in scholarships.
- Club members were involved with the Home Life Department of KFWC and donated 82,152 of volunteer work, \$99,555.49 in 1652 projects.
- The President's State Project was asking every club woman to get a mammogram.
- The Public Affairs project was working on the seat belt law in Kentucky. Child abuse and prevention was also a topic for most clubs as well.
- Romanza was on the KET Advisory Board so many clubwoman helped with the KET Telethon
- The 1991 April Convention was held at the Galt House while the 1992 April Convention was held at the Executive West.

According to the WKU Alumni Association, Romanza O. Johnson received the Distinguished Medal of Community and Public Service Award in 2023 for her exceptional volunteer service. After a successful career as a teacher and Home Economist of Bowling Green Municipal Utilities, her commitment to service earned her numerous accolades on local, regional and international platforms. Having led 27 organizations in various capacities, including President and committee Chair, Johnson's legacy of service is inspirational. Notably, she played a pivotal role in founding organizations that include the Dream Factory of Bowling Green, Houchens Center for Women, Hospice of Southern Kentucky and the Rape Crisis Center, while also devoting her efforts to institutions like the American Heart Association, Kentucky March of Dimes and Kentucky friends of 4-H.

According to Warren County Government, Johnson and her husband, Ralph, donated 2.62 acres of property on Trammell Fork Creek to Warren County Fiscal Court to be developed as a nature park, now known as Romanza Johnson Park. Development of the park began in 1997 and is now a local favorite for canoers and kayakers.

Romanza Johnson was honored by the Salvation Army last fall at its "Champions of Hope" luncheon for being a key figure in constructing the Center of Hope shelter and leading the Angel Tree Program.

Romanza was the very first recipient of the prestigious ATHENA Award, a symbol of her trailblazing leadership. Her creative efforts for the Chamber's Farm City Week campaign earned both state and national honors, and she has received the Ambassadors Volunteer Award an impressive four times.

Romanza Johnson exemplifies what it means to live a life of purpose, passion, and service. Her legacy enriches us all, and we are grateful for the countless ways she has helped make our community a better place."

The Demographics of Domestic Violence And Some Common Signs of Abusive Behavior

Domestic violence can happen to anyone including any gender, race, ethnicity, age and sexual orientation. However, some groups experience domestic violence at a higher rate than others. In the United States, more than 10 million people experience domestic violence in a given year. This is a very alarming number of victims to me.

Women experience domestic violence at a higher rate than men do. According to the National Domestic Violence Hotline, 29% of women and 10% of men experienced rape, physical violence, and/or stalking by a partner.

People of color experience domestic violence at higher rates than their white counterparts. Black individuals experience at a rate of around 9.2%, Hispanic individuals 8.6%, American Indian/Alaska Native 8.2% and non-Hispanic whites 5.7%. (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention)

Younger individuals aged 18-24 have the highest incidences of domestic violence. Out of the total number of domestic violence survivors, 38.6% of women and 47.1% of men first experienced intimate partner violence while in that age range. (DomesticShelters.org)

Lesbian women are significantly more likely to experience abuse than their heterosexual counterparts. Over 40% of lesbian women and over 60% of bisexual women have experienced rape, physical violence, and/or stalking. For men, 26% of gay men and just over 37% of bisexual men experienced abuse. (The National Coalition Against Domestic Violence)

Common Signs of Abusive Behavior

- Telling you that you never do anything right
- Showing extreme jealousy of your friends or time spent away from them
- Preventing or discouraging you from spending time with others, particularly friends, family members or peers
- Insulting, demeaning, or shaming you especially in front of other people
- Preventing you from making your own decisions, including about working or attending school

• Controlling finances in the household without discussion, such as taking your money or refusing to provide money for necessary expenses.

- Pressuring you to have sex or perform sexual acts you're not comfortable with
- Pressuring you to use drugs or alcohol
- Intimidating you through threatening looks or actions
- Insulting your parenting or threatening to harm or take away your children or pets
- Intimidating you with weapons like guns, knives, bats or mace
- Destroying your belongings or your home

These are some warnings signs of abuse that everyone should look for especially when starting a new relationship. It is not always easy to tell when starting a new relationship if someone will later become abusive. The warnings signs of abuse don't always appear overnight and may emerge and intensify as the relationship grows.

Every relationship is different and domestic violence doesn't always look the same. However, one shared feature shared by most abusive relationships if that the abusive partner tries to establish or gain power and control.

Quasquicentennial Moments



Here are some fun facts found in our history of 130 years.

In the early 1920's, KFWC supported "The Farm for Delinquent Girls." We cannot find any documentation about the farm and if this was Jewel Manor in Louisville that KFWC supported. However, at the June 1920 Convention, each club was asked to send a "peg lamb calf or a few fowls."

Mrs. H.G. Reynolds, Treasurer, reported that for the first time in four years, KFWC had money in the treasury and the books balanced. She also encouraged all members to pay their dues by November 1 of 1920.

As a delegate to the 1920 State Convention, you were encouraged to bring a writing tablet to take notes on. You were then encouraged to take these notes home to your clubwomen and share what you learned. If you did this, you were a good clubwoman.
