Anne served as GFWC KY President from 2008 to 2010 with a fitting theme, "Let's Have Fun," and chose the bumble bee as her symbol. A natural educator, she brought energy and enjoyment to every event and podium.

Anne joined the Radcliff Woman's Club in 1989 and quickly became active in projects and leadership roles. Anne was RWC President from 1993-1995 and Woman of the Year for 1996-1997.

Anne expanded her GFWC involvement to the state level where she chaired several committees and ultimately led as President. During her tenure as President, our state advanced in its understanding of the resources available to each community. She provided guidance to numerous GFWC KY members and took pride in observing their individual achievements.

Later, Anne joined a second club, Okolona Woman's Club so that she could be involved in all the "fun" activities. Anne joined OWC in 2010 and by 2014 she was elected Club President. Anne served as President from 2014-2015 and a second term from 2016-2017. After serving as Club President for two terms, she became a member on the Board of Trustees for the Clubhouse. She could have become the Chair of the Trustee Committee, but she felt that someone living closer to the Clubhouse would serve the Club better because she lived so far away from Okolona. Anne was Chair of the Arts and Crafts Committee for many years at OWC. She guided OWC in all things GFWC as well as things involving the Arts and Crafts contest....which she won many ribbons in from her beautiful quilts and appliques. She will be greatly missed by OWC for her knowledge and guidance concerning GFWC, but more importantly her kind and gentle heart.

Anne Aubrey passed away on December 27, 2025 after enduring several health challenges. She will be remembered for her joyful spirit and her ability to enliven any gathering. Rest In Peace.

Reporting Doesn't Have to be a Chore!



It's the most wonderful time of the year !

Reporting can be exciting and joyful! Yes, you read that correctly! Reporting is a time to let the light shine on all of the amazing work your club has done during the year. I see all the wonderful Facebook posts that clubs post on Facebook, so I know tremendous things are happening! So why not share in your club reports? It's really simple. Get everyone involved. Have a soup and salad day/night and invite members to join in the reporting process. Depending on the size and composition of your clubs, you can proceed in a number of ways. Community Service Program (CSP) area committees can sit together and generate a list of activities they have completed in 2025. Someone can look back at your club's Facebook page to list activities shared on social media. The secretary and treasurer can look through their books for donations approved by the club. These are just a few ways to generate a complete list of projects/programs.

Complete the State Statistical Form! If your club does no other report, PLEASE FILL OUT THIS ONE!!!! These numbers are gathered and used to complete a state report which is sent to GFWC. They use this information when working with affiliate organizations and when recruiting additional partners and support.

Complete the individual Cover Forms for each CSP (Arts & Culture, Education & Libraries, Environment, Health & Wellness, Civic Engagement & Outreach) and/or Advancement Areas (Membership, Leadership, Communications & Public Relations, Legislation & Public Policy, Fundraising). **Please be sure you have the correct reporting forms! The ones that show a separate listing for Affiliate Organizations are NOT the correct forms! Affiliate projects are reported along with all other programs/projects in the appropriate CSP area.**

Create Narrative Reports! These reports are single spaced narratives that describe up to ten top projects/programs that you held. Include the type of activity, members' involvement and outcome/impact. These reports are used to determine club awards

at our state convention and Club creativity awards which are sent into GFWC for consideration for national recognition!!

Each of these forms are available on the flash drive and on our state website as well.

Mail or email reports to GFWC Kentucky on or before Feb. 1, 2026!

The Hazel Woman's Club celebrated its 60th anniversary on Dec. 14 at the Hazel Community Center, home of the Hazel Woman's Club. 60-year pins were presented to Charter members Hilda Bennett, Sandra Gallimore and Sharon Ray by Alli Robertson, club member. A key to the City of Hazel was presented to Hazel Woman's Club President Mignon Rutledge by Lori Charlton, Mayor and club member. A festive red, white and silver balloon arch set the tone for the celebration, with several club members and community officials in attendance.

The concept of the Hazel Woman's Club was formulated with humble beginnings in 1964. Members of the Murray Woman's Club approached the original five members of the HWC about starting a club in Hazel. Those members included Hilda Bennett, Sandra Gallimore, Sharon Ray, Janice Wilkinson and Janie Story. The Hazel Woman's Club was officially federated by the Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs in April 1965. Janice Wilkinson served as the Club's first president in 1965-1967.

Over the years, the Hazel Woman's Club has held numerous fundraisers and sponsored many community service projects. One of the Club's early projects was raising funds to buy a fire engine for the city. Club members collected donations from passing cars by standing in the middle of Highway 641 in Hazel. Another project provided a smoke alarm and batteries for every home in Hazel. A recent Club project was a collaboration with the City of Hazel to renovate the Hazel Community Center.

The Hazel Woman's Club currently has 19 members. In addition to the three charter members recognized at the celebration, club members Pat Latimer and Elaine Paschall have 50 years of membership in the Club. Philanthropic goals of the club include awarding scholarships for education and donations to support the arts, literacy, and resources for women.

Or perhaps this year you overcame some challenges, reached a new goal, suffered a loss, waded through grief, or celebrated a big win. Now here we all stand together again, looking at the next chapter in front of us, unsure of what this one will carry. Closing a chapter can feel like a relief or it can feel like a heartbreak. Starting a new chapter can feel exciting or like a tidal wave headed your way. So, what do we do if we're petrified? If we're heartbroken? How do we go into this new year with hope and joy if hope and joy seem to be in short supply?

There is somewhere I think we can all start: let's tell the truth. The truth about how we feel. The truth about what we're afraid of. The truth about what we think. The truth about how things affect us. The truth about where we've been, what we learned, who we are and who we want to be. Who cares if it's palatable or "appropriate" or acceptable? Jackson Woman's Club Debuts Monument

July 28, 2022 was a day the people of Jackson and Breathitt County will never forget. A devastating, historic flood struck our area leaving behind a trail of loss and damage we are still recovering from to this day. That heartbreaking day we lost 11 Breathitt Countians.

The Jackson Woman's Club wanted a way to honor those lives, celebrate the strength of our families and friends who were affected, and the resilience of our volunteers, first responders, and everyone who lent a hand in our recovery and rebuilding process, so we got to work. We had an existing monument in our Main Street Park for the historic flood of July 5, 1939 so we knew creating a monument to go next to it would be exactly what we wanted to do.



We worked closely with the families of those we lost through the Breathitt County Long Term Recovery Team to ensure that we did this project on their time. Allowing the families space and time to grieve and knowing that they were all ready to see their family members memorialized so publicly and in that way was very important to us. Once our families were ready a group of ladies from our club worked with Lees College, the Long Term Recovery Team, Transylvania Presbytery, and Cox Home and Property for providing the space, funding, and concrete work along with Trinity Monuments to create the perfect memorial and owner Earl Chapman was gracious in his gift of a bench to place between the monuments.

On July 28, 2025, the 3-year anniversary of the flood, we gathered our community to unveil the monument. We had a beautiful ceremony filled with love, tears, remembrance, and hope. There is still a lot of work our community needs, but seeing us all come together was a wonderful reminder of how strong our community is.
